- Ava Murphy, 11



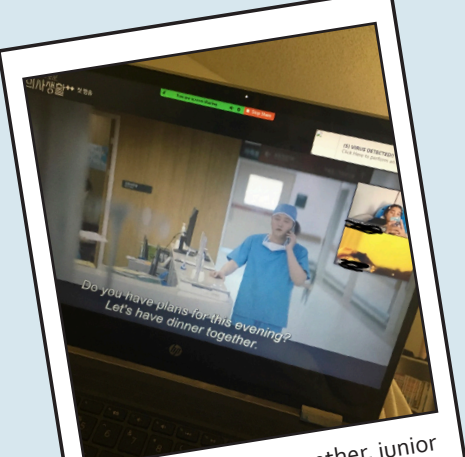
"I became more of an introvert after coming back. I felt like I was more social back then. I'm more selective with my friends [now]."

Despite not being together, junior Alysia Evans Asano and her sister were still able to watch K-dramas together.



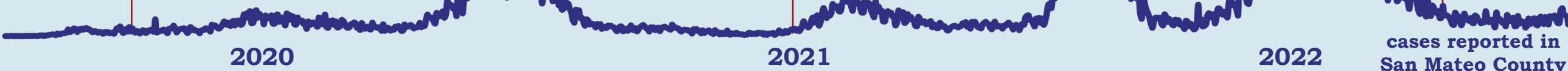

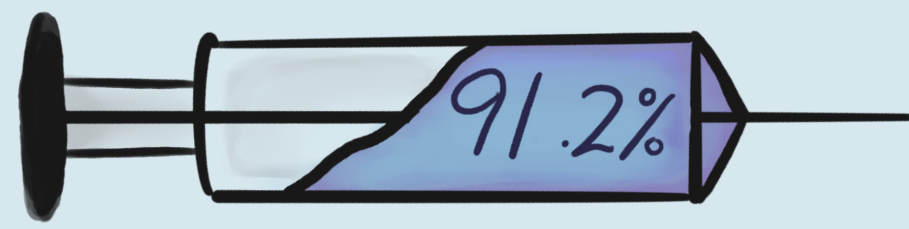
